Let the integer be i

5 time the integer = 5i

Square of the integer = i^2

Twice the square = $2i^2$

$$2i^2 - 5i = 63$$

This forms a quadratic equation.

$$2i^2 - 5i - 63 = 0$$

$$2i^2 - 14i + 9i - 63 = 0$$

$$2i(i-7) + 9(i-7) = 0$$

$$(2i+9)(i-7) = 0$$

$$i = 7 \text{ or } -9/2$$

Since integer value of the number is required, then $i = 7$ (c)
